I've had an inquiry: what do we do to get accepted as an IOCA club? and I suppose I might as well put in a blurb here as to what IOCA is. ICCA (the Intercollegiate Outing Club Association) was formed in 1932 by a roup of college Outing Clubs in the orth-Cast. The purposes were to promote fellowship among the members of the various clubs, to organize a few group trips, and to exchange information. Since 1932, IOCA has grown and changed, but those purposes still hold true.

Through the years, the unique un- (not dis-) organization of ICCA has acquired some traditions (not rules ... ICCA has no rules, nor any constitution). Some of those traditions are the closest thing ICCA has got to rules. Those deal with conduct on ICCA get-togethers.

Mo alcohol or drugs; you will find most experienced outdoorsmen and -women agreeing that the out-of-doors is
not a safe place to be drunk or stoned. We've lost several IOCAns that way. You shouldn't need such things
to have fun on IOCA trips, anyway. No firearms: dangerous. No pairing off to the detriment of the group:
IOCA trips are where you get together to have fin with
others, not just other. 'Officially', IOCA can do one
thing about 'infractions' of the traditions...the execSec can refuse to allow clubs or individuals to join
IOCA, and to ask they be banned from all IOCA activitis.
However, traditionally, IOCAns themselves enforce the
traditions in the traditional ways...usually by immersion in a large, cold body of water.

Not all traditions are restrictive, however; IOCA songfests, trophyizing, and square dancing are justly famous. Traditional IOCA and regional trips emphasize group trips, mostly on a fairly basic level. IOCA does no technical training in outdoor sports; it is expected that experienced clubs and individuals will teach others. These are just a few of the IOCA traditions; one is forever discovering new ones. That's the best thing about IOCA...there's always something new to discover.

I suppose that the main justification for IOCA (although it doesn't need one) is keeping clubs and individuals in touch with each other, through this publication, the ICCA directory, and IOCA get-togethers. Through the Bulletin and other occasional publications, some information of a technical nature is published to the general outing club public.

Going back to the original question, all you need to do is send in your dues (5 for clubs and 1.50 for individu ls), your name, address, phone number, and any trophies you have.

COUSERVATION

In regards to the IOCA conservation and population limit tion policy, I got an inter sting note from Al Prooks (IOCAlum & IOCA-West Co-ordinator). Al believes that a primary cause for destruction of wilderness, etc. is government ownership of land. He thinks that ... well, here's his proposition.

"WHERLAS, government-sponsored and tax-financed wilderness conservation and natural resource conservation programs have demonstrated overall inefficiencies and outricht anti-conservation practices; and . . .

WHIREAS, such government conservation programs have been given low priority due to the government's k habit of catering to special interests groups and corrupt in ustry o ficials; and . . . HACIAS, true wilderness and natural resources conservation will never be possible as long as such resources as air and waterways are held in the "public" domain where no real ownership is possible, and where noone is morally or legally responsible for their pollutional actions:

TE IT RESOLVED, that the Intercollegiate Outing Club association and its affiliate organizations shall encourage all conservationminded individuals and businesses to work toward absolute control of our nation's wilderness areas and natural resources by those willing to practice conservation through direct ownership and control of such resources by the product of an individual's own labor and/or

finances, and to severely limit the red-

eral, state and local governments and their affiliate agencies, in their control and theft of citizen's rightful properties and resources, both natural and material.
